Encountering Other Faiths...and Our Own!

n the month of February we're going to have two wonderful opportunities at First Church to stretch our minds. In addition to our usual educational programming this month, there will be two special programs that are sure to be both highly instructive and extremely informative.

First, our annual **Winter Seminar** on "constitutional thinking" will take place on three Wednesday nights (February 1, 8, & 15) from 6:30 to 8:00 PM, with a fourth "wrap-up" session on a Saturday later in the month (date to be determined). Led as always by our own Dr. Will Harris, a long-time professor of Political Science at the University of Pennsylvania and former Director of the Center for the Constitution at Montpelier, we will explore what it means to think "constitutionally" here in the birthplace of the U. S. Constitution. Our topic this year will be "Jesus: Teacher, Not King" and will delve into the paradox of the traditional image of Jesus as a king despite the problematic scriptural evidence for that ascription. Should the very people (us!) famous for rebelling against a king then use that very image to think of Jesus? Join us on Wednesday evenings in the MacColl Room. You'll be glad you did.

In the past we have from time to time explored other faith traditions. Several years ago, we had a fascinating encounter with Islam and met not only a local imam but many members of his congregation. More recently, we turned our focus to the Baha'i faith, and were extremely fortunate to learn of that tradition with a prominent member of the local Baha'i community. On Sundays, February 19 and 26, we have invited leaders of the local **Mormon** community to meet with us to discuss their traditions and beliefs, and answer any questions that those of us who recently toured the new Mormon temple here may have. We are privileged to welcome Elder Milan and Leslie Kunz who will lead the presentation. Milan is the highest ranking church leader in this region and a retired senior vice president at GlaxoSmithKline. Leslie is a retired teacher and very active in the Mormon congregation in Downingtown. Also joining us will be my good friend and fellow Interfaith Center board member Corinne Dougherty, who is the former regional director for public affairs for the Mormon Church in this area and who will be accompanied by her son Sean, a high school sophomore. We'll meet in the MacColl Room on the two Sunday mornings at 9:45 A.M. Please join us. Again, you'll be very glad you did.

church, is the process of Christians
accompanying one another on our
faith journeys. In the midst of our
fast-paced world, we often find it
difficult to be aware of God's
presence and action in our daily lives
and in everyday events, and to
recognize where God might be
leading us.

In group spiritual direction, Barbara provides ways to reflect on our lives, using prayer, scripture, readings from spiritual leaders, poetry, music, and silence. Gradually, as we share and contemplate together, and deeply listen to one another, we begin to recognize God's voice and powerful presence in ourselves and in each other. We learn to notice the work of God's Spirit in our lives. We also receive the gift of knowing one another better, and of sharing our life of faith more personally.

SPOTLIGHT ON MISSIONS: The Arc of Philadelphia

ounded in 1948, The Arc of Philadelphia, through its volunteer board, staff and membership, has led the way in protecting the rights of and promoting opportunities for children and adults with disabilities. The Arc of Philadelphia is affiliated with The Arc of Pennsylvania and The Arc of the United States and is a member of the SpArc Philadelphia family of organizations. Our mission is to advocate with and for all children and adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities and their families, to promote active citizenship, self-determination, and full inclusion.

We are grateful for the contribution of The First Presbyterian Church to lifting up youth with disabilities and helping establish employment programs within our community. This year, The Arc of Philadelphia has been blessed by an expanding circle of support from employers, government agencies, and families throughout the Philadelphia region.

The work of William DelToro Vargas and Michael Anderson, which has been funded in part by The First Presbyterian Church, established a new template for leadership within the disability community. William has become a statewide leader and was honored with the Eleanor Elkin Award for his work on legislation that provides funding for youth employment, while still in high school. Originally from Puerto Rico and raised in Kensington, William himself has Autism and has overcome great adversity. In his role as Youth Leadership Abilities Coordinator he develops internship and leadership opportunities, educates legislators, families, youth and the community on the importance of employment and leadership, as well as coordinating the annual Youth Leadership Abilities Forum.

Michael, who has Cerebral Palsy, recently received the PAR 2016 "We Are Worth It" Southeast Region Self-Advocate

Employee of the Year Award for his work as a legislative advocate. As the Arc of Philadelphia's legislative advocate, Michael is vital in the fight to protect the rights of children and adults with disabilities. His dedication to the legislative

advocacy program allows The Arc to better inform self advocates, families and our community of upcoming local, state or national legislation changes that will directly impact individuals with disabilities.

We have been able to provide training and technical

assistance to over fifty high schools in Philadelphia and hundreds more across the state on how to access employment supports for youth with disabilities, impacting hundreds of Philadelphia youth. Through work with governmental organizations, youth organizations, families, self advocates and employers we have been able to build on this success to develop even more youth leadership and employment opportunities for the coming year.

The relationships built here have opened doors to leadership in city government to promote additional leadership and employment opportunities for people with disabilities in Philadelphia this coming year.

Nonetheless, our work still continues, and we must redouble our efforts as we enter a new year of uncertainty in public policy.

High rates of poverty continue to pervade within developmental disability community, primarily because of a

lack of access to competitive employment opportunities. The root cause of this persistent unemployment arises from a lack of inclusion and discrimination starting from early ages. In Philadelphia, children and youth with intellectual and developmental disabilities are usually placed in segregated setting based on their diagnosis, making it difficult for them to get the level of education and training needed to be included in the community and employment once they are adults. The estimated unemployment rate in the I/DD community is 85% and many of those that are employed are underemployed.

The systemic lack of leadership creates gaps in service throughout all areas of the community. Most adults also have little to no access to quality health care in great part

because of a lack of training for health care workers. Government services are harder to access, and crucial resources like transportation continue to face cutbacks, disproportionately affecting people who rely on it.

We have much to do. With your continued help, we will transform Philadelphia and make it into an inclusive city that sees the abilities in all its citizens. We serve thousands of Philadelphia's children, youth, families, educators and employers every year through advocacy and training. We invite you to join us in this work and help to create an inclusive community for all our citizens.

Volunteer Opportunities at The Arc of Philadelphia:

• Youth Leadership Abilities Program promotes and supports leadership skills and opportunities for youth with intellectual and developmental disabilities in Philadelphia. Youth and

mentors in programs across the city collaborate to plan and run the Youth Leadership Forum as well as develop other leadership opportunities.

• HealthMeet™ provides screening for individuals with intellectual disabilities and their families, and training to medical and nursing students, medical providers and the general public, and raises awareness of common health issues that impact this population. Volunteers can be trained to provide screenings and help with outreach to raise awareness of health issues.


