Thinking Theologically

Conversations Worth Having Returns on February 17th

Happy New Year!

I am going to resist the urge to do what I customarily do, which is to urge you to be gentle on yourselves when applying the resolutions. (I urge this because, statistically, resolutions are virtually certain to become sticks with which we may beat ourselves.)

No, this year, I want to push us to think theologically, and I have a particular topic, and date, in mind. Our next Conversations Worth Having will be February 17. Please mark your calendars!

The particulars are still being worked out, but our pattern has been to have a Saturday seminar, followed by our visiting scholar preaching on Sunday.

Our guest speaker will be Dr. Brian Blount. Dr. Blount is one of the world's leading experts on the Gospel according to Mark, the book of Revelation, and a topic known as Cultural Hermeneutics.

Let me explain that last one, because it is important for us. For a long time, Biblical scholars privileged what is known as the Historical-Critical Method to interpret scripture, and it is exactly what it sounds like: we use what we think we know about the historical context and the literary structure of a text to determine what we think the author meant. This is the way I was trained as a scholar. But, it

neglects a key factor that a cultural hermeneutic will address. Dr. Blount will explain this far better, but we always bring the totality of ourselves—our lived experience—to bear when we read the Bible. It is impossible not to: someone who is sick reads the passages about healing with a different understanding that someone who has always been healthy. Someone who has been marginalized will see things that a privileged person will miss. Enslaved people interpret the Magnificat differently from rulers...and these insights are vital to interpreting scripture. That alone would be worthy of our attention.

But, I have become increasingly concerned about a problem in American culture, and I've asked Dr. Blount to address it: Christian Nationalism.

A healthy faith uses the lens of the gospel to understand life. For instance, we should all use our faith, our understanding of the Gospel, to interpret what we see in the political sphere. That's reasonable. That's good.

But when that formula gets distorted, the script is flipped: our politics become the lens through which we may interpret the Gospel. That's bad, because the Gospel becomes subordinate to our politics.

I want to be very clear: Some of the sharpest critiques of Christian Nationalism are coming from conservative Evangelicals. Dr. Blount would like us to read two pieces ahead of the seminar:

I also want to be very clear about another thing: it is vitally important to me, as your pastor, that our church remains a place where a diversity of political viewpoints are welcomed and respected. That commitment from me will never change. But we must also be a place where a topic isn't off-limits just because it risks upsetting anyone's viewpoint. We are called to love one another enough that we can risk bringing our whole selves into conversation. That's the idea behind Conversations Worth Having.

We can't be siloed into camps of like minds. That isn't Christian community. And neither can we declare there are parts of life that are off limits to faith. That isn't Christian discipleship.

So, as your pastor, I am asking you to bring your whole selves to a serious conversation about Christian Nationalism. Dr. Blount is an expert in understanding how we bring our whole selves to understanding the Bible, and I want us to have the best guidance as we consider matters of utmost importance. Please look for registration details in the weeks to come.

The Mary and George Schneider **Speakers Fund**

Pastors need the ability to invite scholars to speak on important topics, and sometimes the need for these scholars doesn't line up neatly with our annual budget cycle. So, shortly after I became your pastor, an anonymous gift of \$10,000 was pledged to establish a fund that would enable me to do just that: to invite experts in a field of study to come and be theologians-in-residence for First Church. That became the basis for our Conversations Worth Having, which has brought in scholars to teach on the topics of how we treat our finances as people of faith, and how we recognize and address implicit bias as disciples of Jesus Christ.

Following the death of Mary and George Schneider in May of 2020, the donors sent a request to the Session via our treasurer, that the fund be renamed in memory of the Schneiders, as they were always among the most devoted participants in all of our adult education offerings. The Session unanimously approved. We honor George and Mary's legacy by taking our faith seriously enough to educate ourselves in order that we might think theologically. I hope we will remember Mary and George's commitment to First Church as we engage in our common life of faith by learning together.

Striving for Energy Savings

First Church is always striving for energy savings, both to reduce our carbon footprint and to minimize building-related expenses. As a member of the local District 2030 program, we have a goal to cut our energy footprint in half by the year 2030 (compared to last year, when we joined the program).

ELECTRICITY:

New LED bulbs in Old Buttonwood Hall (OBH), first floor hallway ceiling lights, and chandeliers in the first-floor offices, as well as new insulation in the attic above OBH and the 2nd floor offices have helped to reduce electricity consumption 24% this year through November, versus 2019, the last complete year before the pandemic. This reduction corresponds to about \$1,500 in savings at our current rate for electricity supply. Total 2023 electricity costs are expected to be \$9,500, as compared to \$10,800 for 2022, a 12% reduction. All the electricity consumed at First Church is from renewable sources.

NATURAL GAS:

Saving money on natural gas is more difficult without investing in energy infrastructure. FPC's cost for natural gas (heating and hot water) is about \$20,000/year. To target areas of savings the Committee is monitoring the consumption per heating degree day (CCF/HDD). In 2023, we qualified for over \$1,600 in PGW "Energy Sense" rebates to defray costs for two projects: the OBH attic insulation and a new, more efficient HVAC system for the Pastor's office. Currently, we are reviewing and adjusting the temperature set points in the sanctuary and offices to continue towards our energy savings goals.

During 2024, the Building Committee plans to review energy usage for the whole building complex. The Committee welcomes any persons interested in helping First Church to achieve additional energy savings.




Member Spotlight: Get to Know Josh Banks
