Stewardship

t's such an old-fashioned word. And like a lot of the words we still use in church, it's not a word we hear much anywhere else, at least not these days. I doubt most people today could even tell you what a "steward" is. Do you know?

No doubt that's why many churches have stopped using the term, and instead talk simply about giving. So why do we continue to use the term here? Mostly because no one has ever come up with a better word to describe what we mean by "stewardship" as we use that word in the church. Because stewardship means the care of something entrusted to you by its owner, and that—pure and simply—is the Christian view of life. Because we believe that everything we have, even the very breath within us, is something that has been entrusted to us by God, and therefore what we do with it—with our lives and all that we have—matters to God.

In other words, stewardship is the use to which all of us put our lives. How do you

spend your time? That's stewardship. How do you use your God-given talents? That's stewardship. What do you do with your money, and not just the portion you give to the church, but all of it? That's stewardship. Because it's not our time, our talents, or our money to do with as we please. It's ours to do with as pleases God.

We haven't talked as much as usual this year about stewardship, mostly because our focus right now is—and needs to be—on the ongoing congregational assessment as the first step in our pastoral transition. If you haven't already completed yours, please do so. But of course the work of the church goes on, and for that we very much need your continued support. You will shortly receive a pledge card for 2017 in the mail, and we will dedicate our pledges for the coming year during worship on Sunday, November 13. Let's all be good stewards of what God has given us.

Music at First

SONGS OVERSEAS



n Sunday, October 16th, the Chancel Choir offered a service of Choral Evensong followed by a delicious homemade dinner, which they prepared for all in attendance. The purpose of the dinner was to kick-off a season of fundraising for the choir's trip to Truro Cathedral in England next August. After having received a personal invitation from Truro's Director of Music, Christopher Gray a few months earlier, the Session approved the fundraising campaign at their meeting on October 1st.

The fundraising goal is \$50,000, which will cover the cost of the choir. There is also a "Companion Tour" for any persons interested in joining the choir in England to follow their work, and experience living the "life of a Cathedral Choir." The cost of the Companion Tour is a very reasonable \$2,250. The monies being raised toward the fundraising goal, as well as the cost of the Companion Tour, covers airfare, transportation, lodging, and entry to various sites being visited.

While in Truro, the choir will shoulder the enormous task of singing for the daily services at the Cathedral. These choir residencies are offered to visiting choirs during the summer months, when the Cathedral Choir is on summer break. As a way to prepare for the trip, the choir is singing several Evensong services here at First Church. These services also allow us to step into another realm of music-making, one that comes out of a choral tradition dating back nearly 400 years.

Following each of these services, the choir is banding together to host delicious meals for the congregation, as well as entertainment. You get your souls fed, you get your bodies fed, and you get to experience a truly wonderful time of community and fellowship! The cost for each dinner is \$20 per person or \$40 per family.

Obviously, the goal is a large one. But, with as dedicated a congregation as we are, and as one that places so much importance on music in worship, we can certainly achieve this together. We cannot reach our goal simply through Evensong dinners — we are asking for your contributions as well. In addition to placing contributions in offering plates, there is now the "Vox Box." The Vox Box is located behind

Gwen's desk in the office and will serve as a receptacle for contributions toward reaching our goal. Feel free to use the Vox Box if you were moved by a particular piece of music, or your favorite hymn, or would simply like to contribute in honor of or thanksgiving for your favorite chorister. Contribute as many times as you would like; all donations, regardless of their amount, are taken as equal and sincere tokens of appreciation for the fine



music at First Church. Checks should be made out to First Presbyterian Church with "Songs Overseas" in the memo line, and your contributions are tax deductible.

We sincerely hope that you will consider helping us reach our goal by contributing as generously as you are able. EXCERPT FROM ANDREW SENN'S MUSINGS AT THE EVENSONG DINNER ON OCTOBER 16th



"This past Spring, while on vacation in the United States, Christopher Gray (the Director of Music at Truro Cathedral in England) spent two days in Philadelphia. On the Thursday evening, he came to First Church and led a portion of our choir rehearsal. Afterwards, he said, 'This choir is really fantastic, you should bring them to sing at the Cathedral.'

The First Church choir has never undertaken any sort of tour, much less an overseas one. While it is an enormous commitment, I can tell you, as a veteran of several cathedral residencies, it is one of the most worthwhile endeavors — absolutely life-changing. It goes without saying that something like this is an extraordinary musical experience, even for professional

musicians. But, it is also a wonderful community-building and educational experience, being able to spend time in a 'far away land' all together — and learn not only about that country and its traditions, but also about one another. And, it is indeed a rarity for a Presbyterian choir to receive a personal invitation to an Anglican cathedral. That, in and of itself is a testament to the exacting musical standards we hold here.

First Church is fortunate to believe and to know that music is so much more than 'icing on the cake.' It is central to our worship life, and it is out of our worship life together which comes all of our ministries and mission. Music emphasizes the written Word, it reinforces the preached word, and it expresses that

which words alone cannot. Music is Gospel, Music is Mission, Music is Pastoral Care, Music is Outreach. And music is the most widely spoken international language.

My feelings tonight are those of gratitude — gratitude for the best ten years of music making I've had. Gratitude for this warm and wonderful congregation which I very much consider my family. *Gratitude for the best head of staff* anyone could ask for. And gratitude for this astounding menagerie of musicians who surround me every week, and lift our souls with their song. Realize, that, although I'm their leader, the music we have at this little corner of Gods kingdom would not be possible without all of your support."



The Chancel Choir will sing a service of Choral Evensong on November 20th at 4:00 PM, where we will celebrate Thanksgiving together as a church family. Featured music will be John Amner's Dorian Service, Orlando Gibbons' O God, the King of Glory, and Edward Elgar's Fear Not, O Land.

Following Evensong the choir will serve a delicious "Not Your Typical Thanksgiving" dinner. The dinner is another fundraiser for the choir tour to Truro Cathedral in August of 2017. The cost is \$20 per person or \$40 per family. Join us for a time of food, fellowship, and giving thanks!

Norris Square Neighborhood Project

orris Square Neighborhood Project (NSNP) promotes positive change through youth education, community leadership, green spaces, the arts and the celebration of Latino culture. NSNP provides key supports in environmental education, cultural enrichment, social justice and food access to youth and adults of the West Kensington



and Fairhill communities through after-school, summer and garden programming. For over thirty years, NSNP, in conjunction with youth and community

residents, has been creating spaces of respite, recreation, and resources providing access to fresh produce. In the mid 1980s, NSNP, along with the women of Grupo Motivos, created garden spaces as a means to heal a community traumatized by violence, as well as celebrate the cultural richness of their Puerto Rican and Latino heritage.

Through their programming, NSNP serves low-income Latino and non-Latino high-school-aged youth. NSNP addresses the academic and social issues that afflict youth of the neighborhood through a structured model that utilizes service learning and hands-on project-based learning to enrich youths' academic experiences and foster cultural

pride and a sense of belonging. By providing arts-and-cultural learning experiences, students learn more about their cultures and those of their peers, a critical part of relating to peers and adults. Through NSNP's programming, youth overcome economic and social barriers to success in school and community.





Want to volunteer with NSNP? Volunteers provide critical support for youth and garden programming. They are able to help provide services in the community in a variety of areas including carpentry, technology support, skilled garden volunteers, event support, and other areas. Visit the NSNP
