
A Celebration of Jesse's Ministry

All our Meals and All our Living

irst, I would like to offer a very sincere word of thanks to everyone who has hosted (or yet will host) Lester and me for a dinner in their home as a part of the "Welcome Table, Open Door" dinner series this fall, as well as those who have offered us hospitality of their own initiative. It is a wonderful thing to be welcomed so warmly to a new congregation.

This extravagant welcome expressed through table-fellowship puts me in mind of a line from one of my favorite hymns, "All our meals, and all our living, make as sacraments of thee."

What does it mean to think of all our meals and all our living as sacraments?

A sacrament is classically understood as a visible sign of an invisible grace. And grace is nothing more, and nothing less, than the unconditional, unearned, and unmerited love of God. The grace of God is made known to us chiefly in Jesus Christ, but indeed all of creation sings the praise of God's goodness. The breath we draw and the air we breathe are gifts from God, because we surely didn't make them ourselves. The abundance of the earth which comes to us as the food we eat and the water we drink,

are gifts from God. We could follow this line of thinking indefinitely, but it can be summarized with the words of the Psalmist, "It is God that has made us, and not we ourselves."

One of the great mistakes that humans are prone to make theologically is to divide the world into sacred and ordinary. I suspect we know that to treat any aspect of creation as ordinary is to belie the fact that everything is made by God, but it is tempting to do so, nonetheless. Think of the things we treat as sacred, and the things we treat as ordinary. Worship, prayer, and scripture are treated as sacred, and money, work, and time are treated as ordinary somehow.

These are false dichotomies. God didn't divide the world up into sacred and ordinary. God loves it all, from the tiniest speck of pollen to the mighty oceans. Sacramental living is simply recognizing that every minute and every atom of creation exist within the providential love of God. And when we remember that, every meal, every second of life, is holy. I love a couple of lines from the poet Richard Wilbur, "the world's fullness is not made, but found. Life hungers to abound and pour out its plenty for you."

Have you wondered what Jesse Garner will be doing after he retires from the ministry? (That is, besides fishing!) Well, here's part of the answer: he will be serving as the new Chair of the Board of the Interfaith Center of Greater Philadelphia. The center is a nonprofit organization founded in 2004 dedicated to promoting interfaith understanding in the region.

Jesse has been on the board of the Interfaith Center for ten years. After

serving first as Secretary and later as Treasurer of the organization, he became the Chair of the Board this past summer. In his time on the board, Jesse has particularly enjoyed getting to know other board members from a wide variety of religious traditions.

From the beginning of his ministry here at First Church just before the tragic events of September 11, 2001, Jesse has sought to build bridges of understanding with other faith communities. Among these "bridges"

have been several classes here at First Church led by local members of the Islamic, Bahai'i, and Mormon traditions. Many of us benefitted from the new information and insights gained from those sessions. In his role as the Interfaith Center's Board Chair, he'll be using a different platform to further interfaith understanding and dialogue throughout the region at a time when it is needed more than ever.

On Sunday, October 14, 2018, members of the Presbytery of Philadelphia will join with us in our 11:00 AM service of worship to install the Rev. Dr. Baron A. Mullis as the 17th pastor of The First Presbyterian Church in Philadelphia.

The Reverend Paul Roberts, President of Johnson C. Smith Theological Seminary, will be the preacher. Johnson C. Smith is our denomination's only historically black seminary, and Baron serves as a trustee. Rev. Roberts is a much sought after nationally known preacher and speaker.

What is an installation and why do we have one? On the one hand, it's a matter of procedural business conducted by the Presbytery to say that Baron is our pastor now — so it is significantly and intentionally timed to occur one week prior to Jesse's retirement celebration. But at a much deeper level, a service of installation is about *commitment*. Baron is committing to be our pastor, to walk with us through good times and bad, to pray for us, speak the truth to us even when it is difficult, to love us, and be present in our lives. We are committing to support his ministry, to love him, to treat him fairly, and to follow where he and our Session lead us.

Installation is about celebrating the ministry that we anticipate we will do together for the decades to come. So please plan to be present in worship to celebrate the start of our new season together, and to remain for a reception following the service to greet Baron's family and friends who are present to celebrate this day.

Digging up old bones...

About two years ago, my father's sister (who lives in Philadelphia) and I got together for our annual "summer lunch." She is the family genealogist and has done extensive research into that side of the family, dating back to the 16th century. She told me about my *great*, *great*, *great grandfather*, Joseph Senn (1810-1882), who was an organist and composer. Born in Ravensburg, Germany, he spent the last 40 years of his life as organist at St. Gallus Church in Tettnang, a small city near the Bodensee. She casually suggested that I should try to find some of his music. Never turning down a challenge, I set about trying to do just that!

I've spent the past year in communication with the current organist of St. Gallus, as well as his elderly predecessor who wrote a musical biography of that church. Included in that book is a whole chapter on "Grandpa Joe." Unfortunately, I found out that, around the turn of the last century, many important documents and musical scores from churches in Germany were consolidated into one central location within each diocese. Some decades later, those pieces made their way to various libraries, archives and universities all over the country. This became the biggest wrench in the works, as the paper trail stopped after the consolidation. Thus I had no real way of knowing where his music eventually wound up, short of calling and emailing dozens of Universities and archives. Another ripple in the water was that we actually found TWO different Joseph Senns — both composers around the same time, the "imposter" working close by in Austria. And, having found a few small pieces by the other Joseph Senn, I'm glad to say that "mine" was the better composer!

Through the research of the two aforementioned organists, we were able to locate Joseph's *Missa Solemnis* at the University of Tübingen, a large scale work for choir,

orchestra and soloists. We know this to be by my relative, since there was mention of it in church records. Obviously the facsimiles of the original parts I received were in manuscript form, and there was no full conductor score. Over this past summer, I took on the laborious task of creating a modern performing edition from the original parts. The joys of modern technology have enabled an utterly fascinating journey, to see these individual parts come together on the screen in front of me, and to be able to hear them via computer generated sounds. We have a list of at least a dozen other pieces — masses and motets — that Joseph Senn composed, and hopefully over time I will be able to track those down as well.

This coming November, I will ring in my 5th decade; and though I'm not huge on birthday celebrations, I do like to mark the decades with something extravagant — as I did with my 30th. On **November 11th at 7:00 PM** the choir with many friends, along with an orchestra of 22 players, will bring Joseph Senn's *Missa Solemnis* to life in a 40th birthday concert! I couldn't tell you when this piece was last performed, though I'm guessing not since the time when the music was consolidated. It will definitely be an American premier!

I'd like to extend a hearty invitation to each and every one of you, my First Church family, to join with me in this momentous occasion! This concert will also conclude our *Concerts@First* fundraiser, and will be a ticketed event. Tickets will be available for \$10 in advance from the church office, or \$15 at the door. There will be a celebratory reception following, where I will have copies of the original parts on display. I look forward to seeing all of you on November 11th for a truly memorable occasion!



Facilities Condition Assessment Update

In early 2017, in preparation for his retirement and the transition to new leadership, Reverend Garner made a request that will positively affect our church community for many years to come. This request was to engage a team of architects, engineers, a cost estimator and other consultants to develop a Building Facilities Condition Assessment Report.

Under the watchful eye of the Stewardship and Budget Committee of the Session, a team led by Atkin Olshin Schade Architects (the firm who led the 2013 renovations, masonry repairs, and the columbarium construction) has developed a living document that will inform capital planning and project priorities over the next 5, 10, 15, and 20 years.

You will be hearing more from the Facilities Condition Assessment (FCA) Committee in the near future, as the intent is to undertake some of the high priority projects in Spring 2019. Upcoming projects include work on the HVAC (Heating, Ventilation, and Air Conditioning) system, roofing repairs, and additional masonry restoration. This is the first budget cycle where the Assessment Report is being discussed in conjunction with the operating budget. As such there will be a thorough discussion and explanation to the congregation of how these projects will be financed. These projects along with the financing are strategic and essential to the building and to the future growth of our congregation.

We as a church community should be very grateful to Reverend Garner for his foresight as he hands over the reins to Reverend Mullis. Stay tuned, and we apologize in advance for the construction dust.

Connecting with Other Faiths

In the September issue of the Messenger, we reported on the Visionary Women seminar series that we attended in the first half of the year. The festival last nine days; on the tenth day Hindus celebrate Dasara (or Dusshera), which commemorates the defeat of the demon Ravana by Lord Rama. This year, Dasara falls on October 19.

In last spring's Visionary Women series we did not visit a Hindu religious community, and the tenets of the faith are not that well known to us. An initial exploration of various sources led us to understand that, although there are more than 900 million Hindus worldwide, there is a diversity of

In addition, First Church sponsors quarterly casserole "blitzes," in which we prepare 30–40 casseroles to be served at UCHC meals.

The Arc of Philadelphia advocates with and for all children and adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities and their families, to promote active citizenship, self-determination, and full inclusion.

Urban Tree Connection (UTC) is a nonprofit organization that engages children and adults from some of Philadelphia's most disadvantaged neighborhoods in community-based, urbangreening projects.

Hosts for Hospitals provides families in need of lodging when coming from out-of-town to the city for medical care the option of staying at a locally administered volunteer host-home or group facility.
